The video report is by Human Rights Watch and it is called [Like a Death Sentence](#). It gives a quick overview of the mental health care in Ghana---including human rights violations and well meaning attempts to help by churches. Crossing sectors, cultures, health ministries, worldview, human rights, integration, development, MH practice, etc are all involved in this piece--and in Global Integration.

Perhaps it is something helpful to watch and discuss in a variety of classroom settings, especially as it would likely lead to lots of questions regarding global mental health, the role of faith, and how to help.
